We are pleased to mention that the final phase of the development of Herzog Park has been approved by Dublin City Council and resources have been allocated for its completion. It is also worth mentioning that the fences have been painted in Fairfield Park, and new park benches have been promised by DCC to replace the old ones. These should be arriving in September.

We also want to thank all of you who have joined us in helping to clean our parks and public places, and we will continue to hold our Saturday morning monthly clean-ups throughout the year. We usually meet at Christ Church on the first Saturday of each month at 9:30am for coffee and a clean-up. Hope to see you there!

One of Rathgar Residents Association's newest programs includes the development and support of community events at Christ Church. We hope that many of you were able to attend the fantastic Jazz music sessions in May and July, and our second Rathgar Bloomsday in June. We have been pleased by all of our past events and our collaboration with RBA and Christ Church. We are also excited to announce that we will be supporting our second Rathgar Children's Book Festival on Saturday, October 8. Many talented Irish authors will be joining us and engaging with our young people. Mark your calendars for October 8! We will release more details about this exciting event in the next month.

Your Association is still concerned at the direction that the planning process is headed. A rushed bill was presented to the Dail in mid July, which would allow the outcome of judicial reviews to be frustrated by "providing for an effective presumption that the matter can be remitted back to An Bord Pleanála at the commencement of the legal proceedings. The purpose of this is to recognise that errors can be corrected quickly and delays can be avoided. In effect, an appeal, rather than a judicial review challenge, should be the default position in the first instance".

This is a further example of government by passing the democratic process in planning.

A review of the Planning acts is also in hand, led by the Attorney General and a bill is due to be published before the end of the year.

The Dublin Democratic Planning Alliance (DDPA continues to keep an eye on planning legislation.

Dublin City Development Plan 2022-2028 Also in hand is the city manager's draft of the new City Development plan 2022-2028 and your Association will review it and make a further submission to the one made earlier this year.

Bus Connects It is expected that the National Transport Authority will submit its plans in the Autumn to ABB for the proposed Bus Corridor passing through Terenure/Rathgar/Rathmines

Local planning cases

Since the latest report in January last, the planning committee of your Association has reviewed week by week planning applications within the Rathgar Area and also significant planning applications across the city which if approved might set an undesirable precedent for the future of our area.

Rathgar Garden Competition

We were delighted to bring back the garden competition again this year after the "Covid hiatus". The garden competition runs alongside the Rathgar Horticultural Society gardening competition in Christ Church in July. https://www.facebook.com/RathgarFlowerShow/

There are some fabulous garden spaces in Rathgar and maintaining front gardens and balconies can make a huge difference to the enjoyment of the area.

There were 6 categories this year:

The Best Garden in Bloom Award, went to John Alexander, Rostrevor Road.

The judges felt that this garden was a joyful burst of colours, to be enjoyed by people and pollinators alike.

The Specimen Tree Award, went to Audrey Turley, Terenure Road East.

This is a beautiful, large Copper Beech tree. The Association noted with grave concern that this tree is still at risk under the proposed BusConnects plan for this area.

The Best Flower Pots/Containers, went to Jim Trueick, Garville Avenue.

The owner has clearly taken great care to choose lovely potted plants to create a beautiful green and colourful front entryway. The front garden is an excellent example of how plants can be utilized to create beautiful urban gardens.

The Best Small Garden Award, went to Claire Lynch, Grosvenor Road

The judges agreed that the garden is in keeping with the style of the house and has a balance of colour and symmetry.

The Best Large Garden Award, went to Julie Hopkins, Kenilworth Square

This beautiful double-fronted property is perfectly complemented by its charming front garden – with roses climbing around the front door, relaxed and pretty planting and a table and chairs in the sunny spot it feels like an oasis of calm.

The Best Garden Award overall and the Dixon Cup, went to Kate Crone, Kenilworth Square

The judges loved this garden, with its beautiful grasses and soft planting. It had a lovely array of flowers and looked like a proper Victorian Garden. The judges believe that this garden catches the eye and prompts people to stop for a moment of reflection.

This year represents the 50th anniversary of the first presentation of the Dixon Cup in 1972 to Mrs G.B. Savage.

Congratulations to Kate Crone and all the other category winners. It was great to see the gardens of Rathgar looking so well. The attached photographs give a good idea of the work that goes in to maintaining gardens and The Association is grateful to the winners for sharing photographs of their gardens with us.





Trinity College Botanic Gardens

Carrying on the theme of gardens, adjacent to Palmerston Park in Dartry, is a largely unknown botanical gem. Trinity College's botanic garden was set up in 1687 to support the teaching of medicine in the University. It is one of the earliest botanic gardens in the world. In 1806 the garden moved from College Green to Ballsbridge and in 1967 it moved to its present location. Today the garden supports the teaching research and conservation activities of the Botany Department of TCD.

The layout of the gardens.

The arboretum: This area covers three quarters of the garden and contains over 700 trees and shrubs from Europe, East Asia and the Americas. Here you will find many specimen trees such as conifers *Abies Pinsapo* which was discovered in China in the 1940s at the same time as the genus was described from fossil material. Also look out for the long pendulous fruits of the Wingnut

The Walled Garden: This sheltered part contains the ordered beds arranged to display the evolutionary relationship of plants. This area is used for teaching and various research experiments including plant, insect and climate studies

The Irish House: This contains native Irish and other cool temperate species The collection includes important plants of turloughs-a priority habitat for conservation.

The Stove House: Here are mostly tropical species such as ferns, orchids and bromeliads. Many of these plants grow on other plants(epiphytic) and derive moisture and nutrients from the air.

Near the door are a group of plants-Cyperus Papyrus- which is the subject of research for biomass use and its role in methane emissions from tropical wetlands.

The Cycad House: In the arid conditions of this house, you will find a collection of cycad plants from Australia and SE Asia. Cycads are an ancient plant group from prehistoric times.

The Long House: This house features a large collection of insectivorous plants which have adapted to nutrient poor habitats. They survive by trapping and digesting insects.

If you are lucky, you may experience a performance of trapping and consuming an insect. Something that fascinates both young and old.

The garden is home to the Irish Threatened Plant seed bank. The seed bank is an important gene bank and a major focus of the garden's conservation strategy.

As we become more conscious of our environment and its survival, a visit to these gardens should make us reflect. It is worth a visit!

The gardens are open to the public on Monday -Friday and you will find helpful staff to answer your queries.
